New Hut Fund Raising and Progress

Since I last wrote about this in March, so much has happened that I don't know where to start. You will all have seen that the old hut has been demolished, and the work on the foundations has begun. As I write this, Geostructures (our chosen Contractor) has sunk about 25 piles, with just five more to go, so by the time you read this they will have moved on to casting the ground beams. These are horizontal steel-reinforced concrete beams, that sit across the tops of the piles to make a lattice, on which they will build the floor platform.

We obviously couldn't commit to the demolition and construction contracts until we had either cash or pledges in place to cover these major items of expenditure. We are fortunate that we now have these in place: we started with reserves of £35,000 and a capital grant from REN District of £35,000; our own fundraising produced an amazing £111,000; the Council has made a grant payment to us of £85,000; and we are anticipating an award of £30,000 from the mayor's charity – thank you to last year's mayor, Councillor Carol Melvin.

THE NEW BUILD IS UNDERWAY!

That is an impressive amount of funding to have achieved in the fifteen months since we launched our Appeal in March 2017 – a big **Thank You** to the six members of our fundraising subcommittee who have worked so hard to make this happen. We are continuing to raise more funds to ensure that we can fit out the building to the high standard we would like.

I can't leave this subject without some mention of the trials and tribulations we experienced in combining the Jumble Clear-up with emptying the hut - we had just three weeks after Jumble to clear the site! The District Van worked overtime with several extra runs to the Council Waste facility at New Year's Green Lane. Who would have thought that we would find eight removal crates full of spare tent pegs in the back of our Store Shed – even the Quartermaster didn't know we had that many. They have been gratefully received by other Groups in the District. And why did we have seven spare projector screens in the back room? Answer: one or two come in Jumble each year, and someone thought "they might come in handy"!

Finally, we now know for sure the reason why our old foundations were collapsing. When the contractor started to break up the foundations, he used a pneumatic spike on the end of his digger arm to puncture the surface. When he had done this two or three times, the whole floor collapsed and he estimated there was a 20cm void underneath the concrete slab. Our theory that the soil underneath had been leached away by surface water run-off from the Hogs Back is almost certainly correct.

We hope that the new foundations will be completed in October, and we can then get the new hut structure assembled on the site. If you have any of the following skills and would like to assist with the fitting out, either on a professional/commercial basis or as a volunteer, please let me know. We will need internal cladding and insulation fitting, plumbing, electrical installation and decorating.

The previous mayor, Cllr Carol Melvin, extracted the first brick from the Scout hut, signifying the start of the demolition process which commenced virtually the moment the jumble sale had been put to bed.

Once again we received a tremendous amount of help leading up to, at and after the event. I don't think we had any particularly startling items this year but it still amazes us how many lorry loads of jumble are collected, sorted and then redistributed to homes often far away from Northwood.

So it remains for me to extend our thanks to everybody who had a part to play in this year's event. We remain optimistic about continuing the tradition of holding a sale next year against the entirely new backdrop of a new hut. That alone should increase the number of attendees who will surely be anxious to see what we have been up to over the twelve months.

A few weeks ago when I was at the Scout hut before it was demolished a most peculiar feeling came over me. Every single part of the hut including the back room, den and store shed was completely empty. Plenty of dust but not a single item could be found. The clear-out was exemplary and the thought passed through my mind of the amount and variety of activities that had taken place since the hut was built all those decades ago. The amount of fun it has brought to so many of the boys and girls of Northwood is inestimable.

Plant Sale, Saturday 14th July

Without a Scout Hut around which to base a Plant Sale, we thought at first that we wouldn't have one this year. However, we kept getting so many enquiries from regular plant sale customers that we thought we had better do something about it! We decided to do a cut-down version: fewer plants, less time for buying, much less effort, and reverting to where we had the first fifteen annual sales, in our front garden in Hallowell Road.

It worked a treat. We did one trip to central London in the District Van to collect our professional donations and managed to squeeze in seventy-eight trays and a hundred and fifty 6" pots of plants. Don't be fooled by "one van full"! This is a Long Wheel Base Transit, and we fitted it out with two levels of folding tables, so we effectively tripled the floor space.

We collected the plants on Friday morning, unloaded them straight onto tables in our garden, then spent the afternoon sorting them into some semblance of order. For Friday night I put up Herras Fencing across my front garden, to make sure nothing was stolen overnight (what do you mean, I'm paranoid?).

As luck would have it, Friday night was the first time for many weeks when we had a decent shower of rain, so we didn't even have to do much watering.

Come 1.00pm Saturday, we had a small queue of a dozen people, and the first hour was hectic, with six of us serving customers flat out. The rest of the afternoon saw a steady flow of customers, with a late run when a landscape gardener came in and bought up half the remaining stock.

Our final takings were £1,556, with £39 of expenses. We have donated £450 to the Northwood Live at Home Scheme, £200 to Poindexter Explorers for their 2018 Jamboree fund, and the balance of over £800 to the New Hut fund. The few remaining plants were donated to the Lions' Den Saturday market.
