New Scouting Centre Update

Progress with the new Scouting Centre has suddenly become visible! Having spent over five months building the foundations, when very little was visible, the pre-fabricated wooden wall panels went up in two days.

Since then we have arranged for the scaffolding to be put up, and the building supplier Passmore's returned to site on Monday December 10 to fit the roof trusses.

We have a committee work-in over the weekend of Dec 15/16 to fit some insulation in the roof and then the roof cladding and slates will be fitted by Christmas if all goes to plan. Father Christmas will have a new roof on which to land his sleigh!

The tasks that remain are substantial. We need to fit internal insulation and cladding and get it painted, fit heating, lighting and electrics throughout, fit toilets and kitchen, and sort out rainwater drainage and landscaping.

Some of this work we plan to do using our own volunteer labour, *but we need more volunteers – That's You!* Some work will also be done by contractors, but the budget won't cover all of it that way. If you or anyone you know does this kind of work, professionally or DIY, please get in contact with me, we may have a job for you!

Chairman's Chat

On this occasion I would like to commence by congratulating our Group Scout Leader, Mike Bennett and all the other Leaders we are fortunate to have, for the admirable way in which they have coped by adhering to their programme of meetings ever since the old Scout Hut was demolished.

I understand they have held their weekly meetings in a number of local venues including occasions when they held their meetings on the Hog's Back, which was probably one of the best places to be during the extraordinary weather we experienced this year.

Despite this interruption, as well as not having the usual easy access to many of the items they require for meetings, the quality of Scouting they have managed to provide to our youngsters remains at an all time high. This positive trait shows that our boys and girls are a very versatile group of people who readily adapt to such changes in circumstances even if it's only for a few well spent hours each week.

They should start preparing themselves for another change, namely becoming accustomed to attending their meetings in a completely new, and I mean new from foundations upwards, Scout Hut. The new building is now really beginning to take shape, with the roof trusses as I believe they are called about to be set in place as I write.

Without a great deal on my plate earlier this month I took a stroll up to the Hut to see how things were progressing. Lucky my visit coincided with the delivery and assembly of the outer walls. It was most impressive watching about eight specialists build the structure and, unlike my joinery, every section fitted together like a hand in a well fitted glove.

As you can see from the pictures on our website (www.1stnorthwoodscouts.org.uk) the building is wooden, being made of Redwood Pine, a soft wood grown in Sweden where so much high quality timber comes from partly due to the climactic conditions which result in a slow rate of growth.

By the time you read this newsletter the roof will be in place just in time to ward off the inclement weather which is presumably on the way. We will then be able to concentrate on the fitting-out works such as lighting, plumbing and installation of toilets and kitchen which is when we will be knocking on doors and I dare say twisting a few arms in an attempt to obtain some assistance with these tasks.

I cannot recall that anybody has made any firm predictions as to when the hut will be ready for meetings of the various sections again but I am hoping that the next newsletter will contain an announcement that we will be having a jumble sale next year.

What else is new at 1st Northwood? Well, although not qualifying as new in the sense of straight out of the showroom, we have another minibus. Its predecessor broke down in Wales and had to be stretchered back to Northwood with assistance from a recovery firm.

Analysis at two local garages diagnosed serious issues in the engine compartment after which it was decided that it would not be a practical proposition to attempt repairs. The garage which undertook the diagnosis is going to try to sell the vehicle and offset whatever they obtain against the price of the replacement vehicle we have bought, a transaction which was completed in a matter of a few days. So what looks like a brand new minibus awaits all who will have occasion to use it.

It is not often that we are able to announce the election of some new members to the Executive Committee and three at once is virtually unheard of. It must be one of the spin-offs of having a new hut! The new members are Jean Lou Porcheron, Tim Shipman and Stephen Chapman. We extend a very warm welcome to all three and look forward to working with them in order to maintain a high quality level of Scouting at 1st Northwood.
