

# THE WORK GOES ON !

#### New Scouting Centre Update

Each week this term has seen tasks completed and new ones started. Since Christmas we have made great inroads into fitting out the inside, and as we go to press, we have all but completed the surface drainage and landscaping. The site looks very presentable now we've done away with the mud patch! The most frequent comment from people visiting the new building is "Wow, isn't it big!" This must explain why every separate task is so big and time consuming.

We had the ceilings fitted by professionals, and when we watched them do it, we were very pleased we did – it is difficult work. However, we fitted all the internal cladding to the walls ourselves, all one hundred and ten panels of 8ft x 4ft plasterboard, using volunteer labour from a small hardcore of mainly retired people – my plea for help from parents in the last First News came to nothing, very disappointing that none of you have offered to help. We have also done all the painting ourselves, three coats of emulsion everywhere, so it's looking great inside now. The flooring has been fitted in the kitchen and toilets, and the plumbing is all but complete. Our electrician has also started the wiring.

We are operating within our current budget of £335,000, and to date we have spent almost £305,000. We have continued with our own fundraising all the way through and have raised a further £10,000 in the last six months, and Hillingdon Council made a further contribution of £30,000 in March in order that we could finish the job to an appropriate standard. We are very grateful to them for this.

The new building will be operational in time for the Jumble Sale on 25th May, but it won't quite be finished – don't be surprised if it still looks a bit rough round the edges. We will finish by about the end of June and expect to have a grand opening ceremony in July.

A job with which I was closely involved was the planting of a new hedge along the entire new boundary facing the Hog's Back. I apologise to various mothers that we chose to do this work on Mothering Sunday but it was unavoidable due to various other commitments. The planting of over two hundred 'whips' (young sapling trees) given to us by the Woodland Trust and the London Borough of Hillingdon was completed most satisfactorily in just a few hours, including the installation of rabbit guards and small stakes. In time it should help blend the boundary into the surrounding open space. All we have to do now is to keep it watered and spread the mulch kindly given to us by Hillingdon Parks Dept.

The Jumble sale is approaching fast and the date set for the event is **Saturday May 25<sup>th</sup>**. Your children will be receiving a letter from their Leaders so please look out for this as it contains some important details about the event. On reflection, it may reach you via email but whatever means of communication is used, please read it and respond to the points it contains. The lead-up to the event is always a very busy time for us and while we have some aspects covered we need helpers who are able to lend a hand with straightforward repairs to push bikes as well as some cleaning of the machines. Help with checking electrical goods is always welcome for we receive a significant number of donations in this department. Categorising and sorting our vast collection of books is also a pleasant and interesting task. The Jumble sale will have a different element this year in that you will be able to have a good look at our new Scouting Centre, which we will be delighted to show you.

Lastly we are pleased to be able to report that we have received great support for our Magic Show on April 27<sup>th</sup>. At the time of writing there are still some places available so if you are fascinated by magic, book your seats without delay.

Here's hoping that a high quality of Scouting will continue at 1<sup>st</sup> Northwood and one of the major ingredients to achieving this is to have your support and help when it is requested.

# **Explorer Round-up**

Firstly, a warm welcome to Doug Hull who has joined Poindextor as a leader following a move to the area from Bermondsey - definitely their loss and our gain! Also, we must thank William Johnson, Network Scout Co-ordinator for coming to Unit meetings, helping us to run multiple activities on one night. We have been busy since the last edition of 1st News with visits to PACCAR, a group doing the first coat of paint at the new hut, cooking, bowling and more.

Duke of Edinburgh is going strong with Groups planning Bronze, Silver & Gold Expeditions. The Gold & Silver Groups are away over the Easter break to the Yorkshire Dales with both assessed and practice expeditions taking place. We have many Bronze expeditions being planned from June to September. With the Duke of Edinburgh rules changing to allow young people to start in the school year that they turn fourteen, we have linked up with the Scout section and started a younger Duke of Edinburgh group. This is encouraging Scouts to start their Award as a link to Explorers and, as importantly, sign up with Scouting to do their Duke of Edinburgh instead of school where we losing a lot of them to. We currently have about twenty Scouts doing their Award which they will continue as the move up to Explorers over the next term.

In January we were asked if we could support the Scout Sections Chilly Goat Camp by providing some helpers. Half a dozen volunteers joined a few Scout Young Leaders and made themselves exceptionally useful over the course of the weekend. A group of fourteen took part in the annual February Freezer Weekend Camp at PACCAR (*see picture*). They took part in a wide range of activities and enjoyed their weekend. Many thanks to 6th Northwood for providing the catering for the weekend.

March saw a group of Explorers and a group of leaders take on Monopoly Run 2019. It's played similar to the board game with you receiving a fictional amount of money and a list of properties to visit (the same as the original board game.) When you arrive at a property, you acknowledge your presence and then can buy it if it's available and receive rent every time someone else lands on it. If it's already sold you pay rent. There are fines for not visiting properties, extra money for completing challenges during the day and a lot of fun to be had.

The game starts at 9 o'clock at Waterloo station and automatically ends at 5 o'clock. Over a thousand people took part this year, playing multiple games. Our two teams were in the same game with five others - the Explorers finished third and the leaders fifth so the leaders had to buy the refreshments on the way home.
